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Introduction

Our learning and teaching policy aims to ensure that the children at our school are provided with high quality educational experiences that lead to a consistently high level of pupil attainment and progress.

Aims and Objectives

New Scotland Hill Primary School and nursery provides a rich and varied learning environment that allows children to develop their skills and abilities to their full potential.

Through our teaching we aim to:

- work together to enable children to become confident, resourceful, enquiring and independent learners

- enable children to understand and feel valued within the school and wider community
- help children grow into reliable, independent, informed and positive citizens for the 21st century

Effective Teaching

We ensure that every teacher meets the 2012 National Teachers' Standards through thorough monitoring of the quality of learning throughout the school. The school's Appraisal Policy details the way in which this is carried out at our school.

Our focus is to motivate the children and build on their skills, knowledge and understanding of the curriculum. Our dynamic curriculum documents reflect current national guidelines and statutory requirements and detail what is to be taught to each year group in each subject.

In every lesson we strive to ensure that:

- all children, regardless of their starting point, have an age-appropriate understanding of what they are learning and why
- the teacher has good subject knowledge and high expectations of what all children can achieve
- planning and delivery of the lesson is well organised, purposeful and motivates the children to learn and progress
- effective questioning helps children to think and extend their learning
- staff are effectively deployed to support the children's learning

Partnership with Parents

- monitor the effectiveness of the school's teaching and learning policy through the school self-review processes.
