Individual Liberty	 At NSH pupils are actively encouraged to make choices, knowing that they are in a safe and supportive environment. As a school we educate and provide boundaries for young pupils to make choices safely, through the provision of a safe environment and our new <i>Learning Behaviours</i>.
