Evaluate the significant historical events/periods and people from one or more periods of time and how they impacted life then and the impact on life now drawing comparisons with other significant events/ periods/people studied previously

Interpretations

Explain how sources of evidence are more reliable than others and identify fact, opinion and bias and how this can change interpretations of the past.
